Beauty is only skin-deep, but so was this film

ust because I'm happy with my big fat self doesn't mean to say other women are," said Kathy Burke in Kathy Burke's All Woman. In a three-part series the actress is investigating what being a woman means in 21st-century Britain, focusing on marriage, childbirth and, last night, "the tyranny of beauty", in what is essentially a distaff remodelling of Grayson Perry's masculinity-uncovered series All Man (except at the end of each episode Burke doesn't make a slightly naff pot).

Burke's bugbear, understandably, is the obscene beauty standard foisted on women by Love Island, Instagram and the like, jostling more and more young people into therapy or under the knife. She began with a visit to the Love Island alumna Megan Barton Hanson, a woman not afraid of scalpels. "I don't want young girls to have unrealistic expectations," said Barton-Hanson, a walking unrealistic expectation. Burke frowned.

Would a visit to a different idea of feminine beauty help? Burke has a lot of time for Sue Tilley, the model for Lucian Freud's 1995 painting Benefits Supervisor Sleeping, a woman entirely comfortable with her "magnificent piles of flesh". Freud, said Tilley, thought that libraries should be renamed beauty parlours, because "that's what makes you beautiful—learning things". "Oh, that's interesting," Burke said. "The man who f***ed every woman he met? What a crock of f***ing shit."

A trip to a Harley Street plastic surgeon was a similarly frustrating experience for the viewer, with Dr Julian De Silva wibbling on about the actress Amber Heard having a face that is "92 per cent towards the golden ratio". That golden ratio sounded like a crock of f***ing shit to me, but Burke was a bit too polite to say so. She was similarly kind to her old pal Rankin, the Britpop photographer who

popularised "heroin chic". "You have to look at fashion as fantasy — what you are seeing in a magazine is not real," were his weasel words. These things look pretty real — in magazines, on television, on social media — to teenage girls. Burke said that heroin chic was "repulsive". But she said it to the camera, not Rankin. An opportunity missed.

Beauty is only skin-deep was the message Burke kept falling back on, but everywhere she turned there were young women desperate to conform to a homogenised physical ideal. Burke's well-meaning film, alas, was skin-deep too, amounting to an hour of fretting and beautifully phrased Burkeisms. "Where does this insecurity come from?" Burke asked. Well. This year Channel 4 is launching The Surjury, a reality show in which a panel decides whether a young person should have their "dream plastic surgery" or not. That, perhaps, would be a good place to start.

Meanwhile, in France, Gregg Wallace, that distinctly 21st-century study in aimless, erratic masculinity, had his hairnet on (why?) and was hollering things such as "I want to be a croissant!" at the patient staff of a croissant factory. Inside the Factory used to have a jolly appeal, with Wallace's asinine enthusiasm making for decent junk-food telly. Now it's just dull. Time to shut the factory gates.
